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and bowls, taking pictures of the dogs for placement, scanning them for chips, notification of owners of dogs impounded and posting flyers of impounded dogs to assist owners in finding lost dogs.

"We are willing to do whatever they will let us do," Fuhr said.

She said PCHS would like to offer all of these services at no charge to the city in order to be able to save the dogs that are impounded from being destroyed or needlessly held in a city kennel for longer than the five-day holding period.

"It's just an attempt to get a jump on the adoption process," Fuhr said.

Fuhr said that the more contact they can have with the dogs, the easier it is to place them when the time comes because they can make sure they are socialized, assess them for temperament, give them medical care, and any other thing they might need.

At the present time there are three dogs in the Richland pound, according to PCHS volunteers who keep tabs on the dogs in the

pound.

One just recently came in. The boxer mix has been there 80 days as of today and the black labrador female has been there 71 days.

"If their plan is to kill the dogs, if nobody claims them, why not do that after the hold time?"

Fuhr expressed frustration with the length of time that the dogs currently in the pound have been there.

Fuhr said that keeping them in kennels for that length of time only causes them to go "kennel crazy," although she believes that the pound runs are humane enough, if used for "what they were intended for, a five-day holding period."

The runs are about six feet long and about three feet wide.

Each run has a dog house in it that is as wide as the run and about three feet long.

"The space is limited," Fuhr said.

"Why not accept the offer of somebody who will take the dog and find it a home?" Fuhr said.

Ultimately, the PCHS said they want to save the dogs from being destroyed or suffering and would like to do whatever they can to help them.

Central Methodist University will hold informational-enrollment meetings July 18 and 19 in Waynesville to provide information about academic programs to be offered at the CMU-Waynesville campus.

The sessions will be held from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2 to 6 p.m. each day in Suite U on the Ozarks Tech-

nicol College campus, Town Field Plaza.

CMU Admission representatives will be on hand to discuss educational programs to be offered at the CMU-Waynesville campus and about partnership programs between CMU and OTC leading to a four-year degree from CMU. Degree programs being offered include Business, Child Development, Criminal Justice, Education (Early Childhood, and Elemen-

tary, Middle School and Special Education), Psychology and the RN-BSN Nursing degree.

Fall Term classes begin Aug. 22. They will be held weekday evenings on the OTC campus and will run eight weeks. The partnership program will enable OTC's two-year students to earn four-year degrees from CMU through continued studies at the Waynesville Education Center.

The CMU-Waynesville

campus will also accept students transferring from other two- and four-year colleges and universities and will be open to area residents seeking to complete a four-year degree or to take individual courses in areas of study to be offered.

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resting point between St. Louis and Springfield.

During the Civil War it was turned into a Union hospital and Union troops were stationed in Waynesville. The troops built a fort on Waynesville hill to keep the "wire" road open.

The wire road was a road that was used to move Union supplies from the rail head in Rolla to Union troops in Southeastern Missouri and Arkansas. There was also a telegraph line that ran along the same route.

Pulaski County Humane Society changes

"The biggest change that the public will notice has already gone into effect. Our old phone number with the Waynesville exchange will no longer be operating.

"We have a new number based out of our Loving Paws Adoption Center in Crocker. We expect to be able to man that number in early August, if not sooner. The new number will be: 573 736-2088.

"This system will be similar to the other we had. There may be times when someone is available to answer your call directly, but often you may be asked to leave a message.

"Any animal abuse and neglect concerns should be made to the appropriate law enforcement agency for where the alleged problem is taking place. The Pulaski County Humane Society does not have the authority to deal with these situations appropriately. We will however, assist when called upon by Law enforcement.

"Unfortunately our name - stating Pulaski County - lends people to believe that we have some sort of connection to the county government. We do not. The name was chosen simply to

reflect the area in which the organization intended to concentrate its efforts. We do not and never have received any money from the Pulaski County government or are governed by them in any way.

"We are all volunteers, most with full-time jobs and busy lives, trying to make a better life for the animals of Pulaski County through promoting spaying and neutering, and public education.

"We raise funds on a continual basis to support our efforts and rely greatly on donations and memberships given by a very caring and supportive community.

"As the opening of Loving Paws Adoption Center draws near, we would like to clarify some things. The facility will not be able to house the many hundreds of strays in Pulaski County. We will not be taking in animals using an open door drop off policy. Currently there are in excess of 30 dogs and puppies and 20 cats and kittens on a waiting list to be adopted.

"They are either in foster homes or living with community members who have

agreed to take care of the 'neighborhood stray' until we can find permanent homes.

"These animals are being spayed and neutered by PCHS or generous private individuals in an attempt to curtail the overpopulation in Pulaski County.

"Please do not be angry with us that we cannot do more - it is the fault of irresponsible pet owners that our county is in the mess it is.

"We greatly need an Animal Control Officer and would support community efforts to obtain one, but that is up to Pulaski County.

"As always we welcome any community support. You can visit us our website

(www.pulaskicountyhumane.org) and leave us a message there or visit our Facebook page - we always need help throughout the year with our many efforts.

"We also have fun activities planned that you can participate in with your dogs. We could use individuals interested in grant writing, fostering, volunteering at the Adoption Center, fundraising and many other needs.

"Thanks to our very active members who cumulatively log in close to 400 volunteer hours a month. You are greatly appreciated and never thanked enough.
