mentary, one ELL Paraprofessional split between Freedom and Partridge Elementary, one ELL Paraprofessional split between Waynesville Middle and High School and one reading Paraprofessional for Wood and Partridge Elementary. In other news, the board approved changing the name of the access road that goes to Waynesville High School and the Waynesville Career Center, and

also approved the evaluation form for all food service workers.

Summer school was successful for Waynesville with 232 high school students attending the first session and 176 attending the second session.

The high school students were able to choose from nine different subjects.

Eight hundred students attended summer school in grades kindergarten through eighth-grade. This is about the same amount that attended in June 2010.

ing 203 students in elementary school.

Only two students were expelled from any of the schools in the Waynesville School District during the 2910-11 school year.

In high school there were 18 incidents involving insubordination, 16 involving fighting and 11 involving bullying/harassment.

Middle school had five insubordination cases and

elementary school had four assault cases.

The biggest offenders in high school were male with 163 incidents while there were 62 involving females, middle school had 158 males and 81 females involved, and elementary saw 160 males and 43 females involved.

High school had 238 students placed in SAVED and 209 put into OSS, middle school had 407 placed in ISS and 163 placed in OSS, while elementary had 179 in ISS and 214 in OSS.

not get along with other dogs, that is euthanasia... When you destroy an animal for the simple fact that it doesn't have a home or you don't have anywhere to go with it, that's different.

"I won't use that term," Fuhr said.

Louise Zweerink, a volunteer who worked with the dogs in the Richland pound long before PCHS ever got involved, took her turn to address the board.

"What we want to do and all we want to do here in Richland for you guys is when the time comes and it's up whatever time you have to allow, five days, seven days, whatever it is, to give us the authority to come pick up the dog and take it to our facility and get it shots, a bed, and get it a home. Why would you look a gift horse in the mouth?" Zweerink asked.

Henson replied, "It's not that we're looking a gift horse in the mouth. A decision has not been made."

"All we care about is saving these animals and getting them a home," Zweerink

said.

Fuhr went on to say, "We're willing to work with you anyway we can."

PCHS members reassured the board that they spayed and neutered every animal that they adopt out to homes and the feral cat problem was discussed.

Fuhr said she plans to reapply for the grant to deal with the problem as soon as they can get statistics to help PCHS obtain the grant.

Fuhr asked that the board call her and discuss anything they would like to work out so that they could work together and requested that if the board decided to "destroy" the dogs, it be made public.

Henson agreed to make it public if the dogs were going to be "destroyed."

Fuhr told the *Daily Guide*, in reference to the dogs that have been in the pound for more than 80 days, after the meeting that she felt, "I'm very concerned that they think it's OK to keep a dog in small contained quarters like that."

She said she is waiting to see what will happen because her ultimate goal is to "save the dogs."

or video card. Computer software is considered a school supply and is free from sales tax if its value is less than \$350.

Although anyone making qualified purchases does not have to be a student to benefit from the holiday, the sales tax exemption event is commonly referred to as the Back-to-School Sales Tax Holiday because it occurs near the beginning of the

traditional school year for most students.

A total of 169 cities, 50 counties and 62 special districts have chosen not to participate in the holiday. the Oakwood located next to Sunshine Cafe.

Some \$8,635.34 is owed by a former owner of La Familia who filed bankruptcy.

Livingston's Atomick owes \$5,047.18, but that bill is in dispute because the business claims the fault of the high utility is that of the landlord because of ductwork.

The second highest unpaid utility bill was from the Circle R and the city says it

lacks paperwork on that bill.

Paperwork and a lack of deposits are an issue on a lot of the unpaid bills.

In the past, people were not required to pay a deposit if they owned the property, businesses were given a lot of leeway on delinquent bills, and documentation wasn't required to begin an account.

St. Robert's policies have changed dramatically in the last few years.

The unpaid bills that city utilities are asking to have taken off the books are bills

ranging from 2003-2008.

In the past, a business might have been given a couple of months grace period before utilities would be shut off.

Policy has changed and businesses are treated the same as residences.

A delinquent notice is sent with a cut off date and utilities are cut off on that date if a business or residence does not pay their bill.

The city is also unable to cut off certain utilities at certain times of the year because of weather condi-

tions and there isn't an ordinance in place to separate businesses and residences.

Another change in policy that has helped the city in the case of unpaid utilities is requiring deposits and the way that deposits are calculated for businesses.

Business deposits are figured based on a formula that takes into the account of the average utility usage by similar businesses and the type of meter they are going to require.

"Things are so much better now," Whitely said.
