Paperwork and a lack of deposits are an issue on a lot of the unpaid bills.

In the past, people were not required to pay a deposit if they owned the property, businesses were given a lot of leeway on delinquent bills, and documentation wasn't required to begin an account.

St. Robert's policies have changed dramatically in the last few years.

The unpaid bills that city utilities are asking to have taken off the books are bills ranging from 2003-2008.

In the past, a business might have been given a couple of months grace period before utilities would be shut off.

Policy has changed and businesses are treated the same as residences.

A delinquent notice is sent with a cut off date and utilities are cut off on that date if a business or residence does not pay their

The city is also unable to cut off certain utilities at certain times of the year because of weather conditions and there isn't an ordinance in place to separate businesses and residences.

Another change in policy that has helped the city in the case of unpaid utilities is requiring deposits and the way that deposits are calculated for businesses.

Business deposits are figured based on a formula that takes into the account of the average utility usage by similar businesses and the type of meter they are going to require.

"Things are so much better now," Whitely said.
